EDITOR'S VERDICT

Malvern’s setting does part of the work before the teaching starts: an old public-school campus under the Malvern Hills, with the intellectual ballast of a school that traces its history to 1865 and can point to four Nobel Prize winners in its orbit. That heritage matters less than how the school now uses it. This is a British boarding school for ages 11 to 18, Anglican in foundation, and it still trades on the old virtues of structure, seriousness and self-command. The school’s own curriculum language is revealing. In Years 9 to 11 it pushes independence, critical thinking, academic reflection, target-setting and digital skills, then gives pupils room to shape a GCSE route with eight core subjects plus pathway options that can extend to nine or ten GCSEs. That is not a soft, over-managed model. It is a school for pupils who can cope with a

degree of autonomy and who want their teachers to stretch them.

Parents should shortlist Malvern if they want a full boarding-school experience without the social theatrics that can plague more self-conscious brands in this market. The school has strong enough academic outcomes to command attention: in the 2024 leavers' cohort of **155**, **82%** went to top-100 universities, with **9** to Oxbridge and **43** to Russell Group institutions; Oxford, Cambridge and Durham feature prominently in the destination list. That profile places Malvern in the serious academic tier, even if it does not trade as a frantic results factory. It also carries recognisable institutional credibility through ISI and HMC. Fees are expensive, as they are across this part of the sector: an average of **£60,000** a year for boarders and about **£41,000** for day pupils across the full ladder. Parents are paying for scale, tradition, boarding infrastructure and a school culture that still values scholarship and routine over gimmicks.

The pupil who will thrive here is *self-propelled*, *resilient* and happy in a structured environment with real expectations attached. Malvern suits children who want breadth as well as exam discipline: pupils who will use tutor time properly, take advantage of academic flexibility, and respond well to being told to think for themselves. It is *not for the faint-hearted* or for families seeking a cocoon. Nor is it the right fit for children who need constant hand-holding or a more progressive, low-pressure atmosphere. For the right student, though, Malvern offers a *serious education* in a school with deep roots, a clear sense of purpose and enough academic evidence to justify its place on a competitive shortlist.

ADMISSIONS

Malvern College is a co-educational day and boarding school in Malvern for pupils aged 13–18, offering post-16 pathways across A Levels, the IB Diploma and selected BTEC qualifications. It runs a full boarding community, with around 75% of pupils boarding, and offers full boarding, day-boarding and day options; every pupil belongs to one of its 11 houses. We could not independently verify the school's named intake years, admissions deadlines or the precise assessment sequence, so parents should confirm the practical process, including whether selection rests on entrance examinations, interviews, school reports or taster days, directly with the admissions office.

What is clear is the setting and structure: a long-established Anglican school, founded in 1865, with both boarding and day provision. The published fees are £55,000 a year for boarding and £30,000 for day pupils. The school publishes its examination results and university destinations openly. On financial support, no bursary or scholarship detail appears in the material supplied, so parents should confirm the range of awards with the school directly.
