EDITOR'S VERDICT

Ipswich Grammar School trades on two assets that many Queensland schools cannot match: history and clarity of purpose. Founded in ****1863****, it is Queensland’s oldest grammar school, and the setting still matters. The Great Hall on Grammar School Hill gives the school a physical centre of gravity that newer campuses cannot manufacture; this is a school with **institutional memory**, **ceremonial heft** and a strong sense of continuity. The proposition is plain: boys-only, non-denominational, day and boarding, Prep to Year 12, with English as the language of instruction and the QCE curriculum. That focus gives Ipswich Grammar a clean market position. Parents who want a co-educational, progressive, loosely structured environment should look elsewhere. Parents who want a traditional boys’ school with a defined code, visible heritage and a serious boarding identity should put it on the shortlist.

What marks Ipswich Grammar out is not novelty but discipline of method. The school states that Explicit Teaching is its instructional framework, with lessons broken into sequenced blocks, clear goals and weekly parent feedback. That is a concrete academic model, not empty rhetoric. It suits boys who benefit from structure, repetition and direct instruction, and it gives parents a clear idea of how teaching works day to day. The school also advertises more than ****40**** co-curricular activities, with sport given real prominence through its connection to the GPS tradition. That mix creates a **competitive edge**, **old-school rigour** and a culture that prizes performance, routine and participation over self-expression for its own sake.

Boarding is central to the school’s identity, not a side offering. The public emphasis on “Building the Future of Boarding” and the dedicated IGS Connect programme for boys in rural and remote Australia tell parents exactly where the school sees growth and purpose. That strengthens its appeal for country families who want a metropolitan education without losing a recognisable pastoral and community framework. It also sharpens the school’s type: this is a good fit for boys who thrive in a structured

community, who enjoy sport and house-style belonging, and who respond to clear expectations. Boys who dislike hierarchy, ceremonial culture or single-sex schooling will not enjoy it. Boys who want *clear standards*, *strong routines* and *a robust sense of belonging* will.

STRENGTHS

- One of Queensland's oldest schools, founded in 1863, with a well-established heritage campus in Ipswich.
- Member of the GPS (Greater Public Schools) Queensland association, giving boys a long-standing competitive sporting pathway.
- Offers both day and boarding places, providing an option for regional and international families needing residential care.
- Delivers the QCE curriculum with an ATAR pathway, giving graduates a recognised route into Queensland and interstate universities.
- Located around 40km from Brisbane, making it a more affordable alternative to inner-city GPS schools for families willing to commute or board.

TRADE - OFFS

- All-boys school, so it will not suit families wanting a co-educational environment for their son or a place for daughters.
- Distance from Brisbane CBD means day families outside Ipswich face a longer commute than at city-based GPS schools.
- Boarding adds a further layer of fees on top of tuition, which should be budgeted for separately.
- As a single-sex, mid-sized regional school, subject and elective breadth in senior years may be narrower than at larger metropolitan campuses.

ADMISSIONS

Enrolment applies from Prep through to Year 12, with common entry points at Prep, Year 5 and Year 7, and additional places sometimes available at Year 10 or 11. Families apply directly via the school's enrolment office, typically providing academic and behavioural references, and are asked to enrol well in advance, particularly for boarding places and popular entry years. Places are not guaranteed and are assessed on a case-by-case basis rather than through a standardised entrance exam.
