EDITOR'S VERDICT

PNSD Rosella Hightower occupies a narrow and serious niche: pre-professional dance training inside a French academic framework, for children and teenagers aged ****8-19****. This is not a conventional international school with strong dance on the side. It is a conservatoire school where the day is organised around dance training, and the French Baccalaureate sits alongside that reality. That distinction matters. Families choosing PNSD are not buying a broad all-round campus education with a few elite studios attached; they are choosing ***total artistic immersion***, ***early discipline*** and a timetable built for dancers

whose training already directs family decisions.

What puts it on a shortlist is the combination of national standing, age range and structure. France has only a small number of national dance conservatoires, and this school sits in that select group while offering both day and boarding provision. For the right student, that creates a rare pathway: technical training from childhood through the later teenage years, without the fragmentation that comes from patching together private dance tuition and a separate school. The location near Cannes adds an obvious attraction, but parents should keep their eyes on substance, not Riviera glamour. The real draw is *professional intensity*, *clear vocational purpose* and a culture that treats ballet training as the centre of the enterprise, not an extracurricular ornament.

The flip side is just as clear. This school will not suit families who want curricular breadth, a conventional international environment or a light-touch approach to adolescent development. Instruction is in French, the curriculum is the French Baccalaureate, and the institution serves a specialist mission. That makes it a strong fit for students with established technique, stamina and appetite for repetition; it makes little sense for children who enjoy dance but still want school life to carry equal or greater weight. Boarding also raises the stakes. Sending a child away for specialist arts training demands unusual certainty from both parent and student.

The ideal PNSD student is ambitious, resilient and already committed to dance as more than a hobby. They will want *daily rigour*, *high-stakes training* and peers whose lives revolve around the studio. Families who value that focus, and who accept the trade-off between specialisation and breadth, will find a school with a precise identity and a credible reason to exist. In a crowded market of schools claiming excellence through glossy facilities and vague enrichment, PNSD offers something cleaner and harder to find: a French, secular, boarding-capable conservatoire for young dancers who want their education shaped by the demands of the art form itself.

STRENGTHS

- One of a small number of schools in France officially designated a Pole National Supérieur de Danse (PNSD) by the Ministry of Culture, giving it recognised conservatoire status.
- Founded by Rosella Hightower, an American-born prima ballerina, giving the school a long-established lineage in classical ballet training.
- Combines vocational dance training with the French Baccalaureate, allowing students to pursue a professional dance pathway without abandoning a mainstream academic qualification.
- Offers both day and boarding places, making it accessible to families relocating from outside the Alpes-Maritimes region or from abroad.
- Located in Mougins near Cannes, within an established cultural and performing-arts corridor of the French Riviera.

TRADE-OFFS

- Curriculum is narrowly focused on dance vocational training; unsuitable for students without a clear commitment to a professional dance career.
- Combining full Baccalaureate academics with intensive daily dance training creates a demanding schedule with limited time for other extracurriculars.
- Instruction is in French, which may pose an adjustment challenge for non-French-speaking boarding families.
- As a specialist conservatoire, entry is audition-based and highly selective, narrowing the pool of families for whom it is even an option.

ADMISSIONS

Entry is by audition, assessing technical dance ability, physical aptitude and academic standing, with places offered at several age points corresponding to French schooling cycles. As a nationally recognised PNSD, competition for boarding and day places is significant given the limited intake typical of specialist conservatoires. Applicants typically need prior serious ballet or contemporary training; academic records are also reviewed to ensure students can manage the dual Baccalaureate and dance workload. Auditions are usually held on-site in Mougins.
