EDITOR'S VERDICT

Set in Wezembeek-Oppem rather than central Brussels, Deutsche Schule Brüssel offers a German-school route that remains **distinctive** in this market: a non-religious day school for ages 3 to 18, taught in German and English, and leading to the German Abitur. That alone narrows the field. Brussels has no shortage of international schools with English-medium pathways; far fewer schools ask families to commit to a German academic culture from the early years through to university entrance. For parents who want that continuity, this school earns a place on the shortlist quickly. Its “Excellent German School Abroad” accreditation matters too. It marks the school as part of a recognised German overseas network rather than a loose international imitation of one.

The other point in its favour is price. An average annual fee of **€17,447** across the full age range puts it in a *strikingly good-value* bracket by Brussels international-school standards. That does not make it cheap in any absolute sense, but it does make it more accessible than many expatriate-facing competitors charging premium Anglo-international rates. Parents paying those fees are buying a clear academic proposition, not a lifestyle campus or a grab-bag of curricular options. The school is day-only, non-religious and tightly defined. That focus will appeal to families who want substance, order and a qualification with weight in German-speaking higher education.

This is not the school for parents who want a soft, highly flexible international model with endless subject pathways and constant hand-holding. The Abitur route suits students who are comfortable in a *structured*, academically serious environment and who can work in German at a high level as they move up the school. Bilingual or internationally mobile families with German connections will find the proposition *unusually coherent*. So will parents who value green, quieter surroundings over urban buzz: Wezembeek-Oppem gives the school a more *settled* feel than many city campuses. Students who thrive here will be those who value routine, intellectual discipline and a clear endpoint. Students who want a looser, more buffet-style international education will fit better elsewhere.

STRENGTHS

- Follows the German state curriculum through to the Abitur, a qualification recognised for direct university entry across Germany and the EU.
- Located in Wezembeek-Oppem, part of Brussels' established international-school belt with good transport links to the EU quarter and NATO.
- As a German school abroad, it typically maintains a formal link to Germany's Federal Foreign Office schooling network (Auslandsschulwesen), giving continuity with the German system.
- Provides a natural continuation route for German-speaking families posted to Brussels for EU institutions, NATO or German corporate assignments.
- Day-school structure keeps children embedded in family life locally rather than in a boarding environment.

TRADE-OFFS

- Instruction is German-medium and follows the German curriculum exclusively, which narrows the pool of families for whom it is a realistic fit.
- No boarding option, so it only serves families already resident in or near Brussels.
- Editorial visibility and international brand recognition are modest compared with larger, more globally marketed Brussels international schools.
- Location in Wezembeek-Oppem means a commute for families not settled in the eastern Brussels suburbs.

ADMISSIONS

Entry points generally align with the German school calendar, with intake possible from Grundschule (primary) through to Gymnasium stages, subject to space. Families typically apply directly to the school office with prior school reports and, where relevant, German-language ability documentation. As a school for the German-speaking expatriate community, German proficiency (or willingness to acquire it quickly) is a practical prerequisite rather than an optional extra. Competitiveness is driven more by capacity per year group than by academic selection.
