EDITOR'S VERDICT

Lycée Français de Varsovie occupies a precise niche in Warsaw: a French state-linked education inside the AEFÉ network, with the continuity and discipline that network brings. For families who want the French Baccalaureate rather than an international hybrid, this is one of the clearest options in the city. The school runs from age 3 to 18, teaches in French, and spans two campuses: one for preschool and primary, the other for administration, lower secondary and sixth form. That split matters. It gives younger children a distinct setting, while older students work in a more senior academic environment. The school

also states that it offers a welcome programme for non-Francophone children, plus a Polish international section for pupils planning to study in Poland. That combination gives LFV a practical edge for international families who need both *linguistic immersion* and a route into local higher education.

What puts it on a shortlist is not glitz but structure. AEFÉ membership ties LFV into a network of **580** French schools in more than **139** countries, which carries real value for diplomatic, expatriate and mobile families: transfers are simpler, the curriculum stays coherent, and the school is plugged into a system larger than itself. The school also pushes multilingualism, intercultural exchange and civic education hard, and that is consistent with the French model at its best: *intellectual seriousness*, secular values and a curriculum that does not dilute itself to chase fashion. There are more than **30** extracurricular activities for nursery and primary pupils, and the school highlights sustainability projects, student life initiatives and anti-violence work. What it does not publish here is the data hard-headed parents also want: aggregate Baccalaureate outcomes, university destinations, or detailed cohort sizes. That opacity does not negate the school’s strengths, but it does leave parents to ask sharper questions at enquiry stage.

The right child for LFV is one who thrives with academic structure, explicit expectations and French as the working language. This suits francophone families first, but also internationally minded households ready to commit to *full French-medium schooling* and the demands that come with it. It will also appeal to students who value *cultural fluency* over a loose international-school atmosphere, and to families who want Poland kept in view through Polish language, history and literature. Children who need constant pastoral hand-holding, broad public disclosure of outcomes, or a more flexible Anglo-style curriculum will find stronger fits elsewhere. LFV is for parents who want *institutional depth*, *cross-border continuity* and a school with a clear educational spine.

STRENGTHS

- Accredited by AEFÉ (Agence pour l'enseignement français à l'étranger), giving access to the official French national curriculum and Baccalaureate.
- Continuous schooling pathway from maternelle through terminale under one institution, easing transitions for long-term expat families.
- Graduates receive the French Baccalaureate, a qualification recognised for direct entry to French and many European universities.
- Location in Warsaw offers a lower cost of living than major Western European capitals where French lycées typically operate.
- Part of a global AEFÉ network, which can ease transfers for French diplomatic and corporate families relocating between postings.

TRADE-OFFS

- Tuition and fee structures are not transparently published in detail on the school website, making budgeting harder for prospective families.
- Instruction is predominantly in French, which can be a barrier for non-Francophone children without strong prior language preparation.
- As a single-curriculum French Baccalaureate school, it offers less flexibility than IB or bilingual schools for families uncertain of long-term country plans.
- Being a niche expat-oriented school in Warsaw, it has a smaller applicant pool and less independent inspection or league-table data available than larger international hubs.

ADMISSIONS

Admission is typically possible at multiple entry points from maternelle (nursery) through to lycee (senior secondary), subject to space availability. Priority is often given to French nationals and children with prior French-curriculum schooling, in line with AEFÉ network norms. Families should contact the school directly for placement testing or French-language proficiency assessment, particularly for entry above the earliest years. Competitiveness varies by year group, with limited places at senior levels making late entry harder to secure.
