EDITOR'S VERDICT

Rafa Nadal Academy is not a conventional international school with a strong sports department. It is a tennis training centre in Manacor, opened in **2016**, with schooling attached. That distinction matters. The proposition is clear: a US High School Diploma delivered in English and Spanish alongside an elite tennis programme built around Rafael Nadal’s training method and a large technical staff. For families who want a standard academic pathway first and sport second, this is the wrong shortlist. For families chasing serious daily training without abandoning school, it has *real force*.

What sets it apart is concentration. The school’s own pitch is full-spectrum formation; the practical draw

is simpler: children and teenagers aged **6-18** can train in an environment designed around tennis, with coaching leadership split across junior, ATP and WTA pathways. Add the scale of the campus — **45** tennis courts, as your editorial context notes — and the offer becomes unusually specific. This is not a place for the mildly sporty child who enjoys a weekly lesson. It is for the player who wants repetitions, structure, competitive peers and a campus where tennis is the organising principle. In that market, the academy has *serious credibility* and *a hard competitive edge*.

Parents should still keep their eyes open. Academic transparency is thin. The academy states the diploma route, but it does not publish the kind of aggregate academic outcomes that let parents judge classroom strength with confidence. The public story rests far more heavily on coaching, facilities and the Nadal name than on exam data or university destinations. That imbalance will not trouble every family; for some it is the entire point. But this is an expensive specialist choice, not a broad academic all-rounder with tennis as an extra. The right buyer knows that and wants it anyway.

Who belongs here? A disciplined young tennis player, already committed, who can handle a *demanding routine*, a boarding or day structure, and the fact that sport drives the culture. The academy also suits internationally mobile families targeting US college sport, including NCAA routes flagged in your context, while wanting an American diploma rather than a local Spanish track. The child who thrives here is competitive, resilient and happy in an environment with *constant sporting intensity* and *little room for drift*.

ADMISSIONS

Entry is primarily geared toward competitive junior tennis players seeking to combine training with a US high school diploma; families typically apply directly through the Academy's website, submitting academic records, tennis ranking or competition history, and undergoing an on-site or video assessment with coaching staff. Places in the boarding program are limited by court and dormitory capacity, making the tennis element more selective than the academic side. Day-student and shorter training-camp options exist alongside the full-time diploma track. Rolling admissions apply, with intake tied to the academic year and specific tennis training blocks.
