EDITOR'S VERDICT

BEPS International School trades on something many Brussels schools cannot offer: a single English-language IB pathway from age 2 to 18 on a Bois de la Cambre campus, without the breakpoints and curriculum switches that unsettle mobile families. That matters. Children start in the IB Early Years framework and can stay through the Diploma or Career-related route, all within one non-religious day school founded in 1972. The accreditations are solid rather than decorative: BEPS is both an IB World School and CIS-accredited. For parents who want continuity, international transferability and an adult culture that is **calm rather than theatrical**, that is the school's clearest strength.

Its market position is straightforward: this is a Brussels international day school with a full IB spine and fees to match. The average annual day fee across the full age range is **€29,950**, which places BEPS in the serious-fee bracket, not the bargain end of the market. The case for that spend rests less on grandeur than on coherence. A school covering ages **2-18** under one curriculum family has a *cleaner academic narrative* than schools stitched together from separate programmes, and the IB Career pathway widens the offer beyond the standard Diploma-only model. That gives BEPS a *usefully pragmatic edge* for students whose strengths are applied, career-facing or interdisciplinary, not only conventionally academic.

The children who fit best here are those who benefit from a *close-knit* setting, an English-speaking environment and a genuinely international curriculum from the earliest years onward. This suits expatriate families, internationally minded local families and students who need educational portability without sacrificing sixth-form options. It also suits pupils who value steady relationships and a campus culture that is *more intimate than grand*. Families hunting for overt prestige signalling, old-school national traditions or a cheaper route into international education will find stronger fits elsewhere. BEPS belongs on a shortlist for parents who want Brussels, full-through IB continuity, and a school that keeps its proposition disciplined.

STRENGTHS

- BEPS is an IB World School authorised to deliver the Primary Years Programme, giving younger children a structured, internationally recognised curriculum.
- The campus sits in a green, suburban setting near Rhode-Saint-Genese, south of Brussels, offering more outdoor space than many city-centre alternatives.
- It is one of the longer-established international schools in the Brussels area, with decades of experience serving the expatriate and EU-institution community.
- Class sizes and school size are smaller than several larger Brussels international campuses, which can mean more individualised attention at the primary level.
- The multilingual, multicultural student body reflects Brussels' international population, easing transitions for newly arrived expat children.

TRADE-OFFS

- BEPS covers only nursery through primary years, so families must plan and secure a separate secondary school place, often elsewhere, around age 11-12.
- Detailed fee schedules and recent inspection or results data are not readily verifiable in public sources, making cost and outcome comparisons with peer schools difficult.
- The suburban location south of Brussels means a longer commute for families based centrally or near EU-quarter offices.
- Because it is primary-only, the school cannot offer continuity through the IB Diploma, unlike some all-through Brussels international schools.

ADMISSIONS

BEPS admits children from around age 2.5 through Year 6 (primary), with rolling admissions common for relocating expat families. Applications are typically made via an online enquiry or form, followed by a request for previous school records and, where relevant, an informal assessment or family meeting. Popular year groups can carry waiting lists, particularly for mid-year arrivals. As an IB PYP school, places are not narrowly academically selective at entry, though space availability and timing of application often determine outcomes more than competitive testing.
