EDITOR'S VERDICT

The Hammond School occupies a narrow, serious niche: vocational performing arts education for children and teenagers who want technical training built into the school day, not bolted on after lessons. That is the point of the place. It offers GCSE, A-Level and BTEC pathways within a day-and-boarding structure for ages 8-19, with English as the language of instruction and ISI accreditation. The fees — **£15,000** a year for day pupils and **£30,000** for boarders — put it in the expensive bracket, but this is not a conventional independent school with a strong dance department. It is a specialist school in which performance training drives the timetable and the culture. For the right child, that focus is *transformative*, *demanding* and *clear-eyed*.

What sets Hammond apart is the age at which that specialisation starts. Many schools talk about nurturing talent; Hammond organises school life around it from childhood through sixth form. That matters for families who do not want to choose between academic continuity and sustained vocational training. The attraction is obvious: one institution, one discipline-heavy routine, one peer group of equally committed young performers. The trade-off is just as obvious. This is not the best fit for a child who wants a broad, conventional school experience with sport, societies and the arts in balanced proportion. Hammond is for students who already know that dance or musical theatre sits near the centre of their identity, and who can handle a *high-pressure*, *studio-led* environment without romantic illusions about the workload.

Why shortlist it? Because Britain has very few schools with this level of specialism across the full **8-19** age range, and fewer still with boarding attached. For families outside Chester, that boarding offer widens access to a school that functions as a pipeline into professional training. For local families, the day option gives access to the same specialist culture at half the annual fee. The school's strongest selling point is not polish or prestige language; it is structural commitment. If your child needs daily vocational training, disciplined peers and a timetable built around performance, Hammond deserves close attention. If your child is talented but undecided, socially fragile, or hungry for academic breadth first and specialisation second, there are better options. Hammond suits the *single-minded*, the *resilient*, and the young performer who wants school to feel less like a campus and more like a *working conservatoire*.

STRENGTHS

- Combines academic study through GCSE, A-Level and BTEC with intensive daily dance, drama and musical-theatre training on one campus.
- Offers both day and boarding places, with dedicated boarding for ages 11-16 and private-sector lodgings arranged for ages 16-18.
- Designated a centre of excellence under the government's Music and Dance Scheme, giving access to specialist funding and pathways.
- Purpose-oriented studios and theatre spaces support a training regime tailored to dance and drama pupils rather than bolted onto a generic timetable.
- Publishes GCE and GCSE results headlines on its own website across recent years.
- Fees sit below many comparable boarding schools, making specialist training relatively accessible.

TRADE-OFFS

- The heavily vocational, dance-led timetable is not suited to families wanting a broad, non-arts-focused academic education.
- Boarding fees represent a significant financial commitment for families relocating from further afield.
- Academic subject choice at GCSE and A-Level is narrower than at large all-round independent schools, given the time devoted to daily vocational training.
- As a niche specialist school, sixth-form cohort size and university-preparation resources are smaller than at large independent colleges.
- Dedicated on-site boarding runs only to age 16, with 16-18 students housed in private-sector lodgings arranged by the school.

ADMISSIONS

Entry is available across year groups from age 11 through sixth form, with places dependent on an audition or assessment in dance, drama or musical theatre alongside standard academic screening. Prospective pupils typically attend an audition day combining a technical class, interview and sometimes an academic test. Competition is highest for vocational dance places, reflecting the school's specialist reputation, while day and boarding places are offered subject to space and suitability. The school actively welcomes international applicants, with auditions available by video pre-screen and student-visa support provided. Families should contact admissions directly for current audition dates, entry-year options and any scholarship or means-tested bursary provision.
