EDITOR'S VERDICT

Eunoia Junior College occupies a distinct niche in Singapore’s pre-university market. Opened in ****2017****, it is young by local standards, but it does not operate like a start-up. Its roots run through three established feeder schools — Catholic High School, CHIJ St Nicholas Girls’ School and Singapore Chinese Girls’ School — and that alliance gives EJC a built-in identity, applicant base and academic seriousness. The proposition is clear: a government junior college with a new campus, an Integrated Programme link across those partner schools, and a culture that talks openly about **beautiful thinking**, bicultural breadth and **unconventional wisdom**. The school’s site leans hard into aspiration, but the practical point for parents is simpler: EJC offers a recognisable Singapore National route in English, with the institutional

backing of the Singapore MOE, in a school that was designed for contemporary teaching rather than inherited piecemeal.

What sets it apart is the combination of scale, age and intent. EJC markets itself as a school “born in the digital age” and located on the edge of Bishan-Ang Mo Kio Park; that pairing of urban vertical campus and access to green space is unusual in land-scarce Singapore. It also carries a clear bicultural thread through its founding partnership with three long-established Chinese mission schools, even though EJC itself is non-religious. For families who value academic discipline with a more **forward-looking** institutional mood, that matters. This is not a legacy college trading on old buildings and old myths. It is a recent merger-school turned standalone brand, and that gives it a **pioneering spirit** that older competitors cannot manufacture. The trade-off is equally plain: families who want a century-old junior college with generations of alumni tradition will find a newer, still-settling culture here instead.

Why shortlist it? Because it answers a specific parental brief very well. EJC suits ambitious students who want a rigorous Singapore academic environment without the weariness or rigidity that can creep into older institutions. It will appeal to children who are intellectually confident, comfortable in a high-performing peer group, and interested in shaping a young school culture rather than simply inheriting one. It also fits students drawn to **bold and bright** company, structured mentoring and a campus experience with a strong sense of design and identity. It is less suited to teenagers who need a very broad, visibly eclectic intake or who want the social certainty of a deeply entrenched school tradition. In market terms, EJC sits as a polished, academically credible, urban day school for ages ***13-18***: modern, selective in tone, and attractive to families who want **new ambition** built on old-school educational capital.

STRENGTHS

- Purpose-built Bishan campus (opened December 2019) is Singapore's first high-rise junior college, with a 900-seat auditorium, a duplex library and an elevated eight-lane track and stadium on level five.
- Offers three MOE-endorsed special programmes -- the Bicultural Studies Programme (Chinese), the Humanities Programme and the Music Elective Programme -- broadening subject choice beyond a standard JC curriculum.
- 2025 Joint Admissions Exercise cut-off points were 5 for the Science course and 6 for the Arts course, reflecting a highly selective, academically strong intake.
- Functions as the dedicated pre-university stage of the Joint Integrated Programme with Catholic High School, CHIJ St Nicholas Girls' School and Singapore Chinese Girls' School, giving JIP students a seamless six-year pathway without sitting O-levels.
- Located in Bishan close to Bishan and Bright Hill MRT stations, giving reasonably central, well-connected access across Singapore.

TRADE-OFFS

- A young institution, established only in 2017 and moved into its permanent campus in 2019, so it lacks the multi-decade track record and old-boy/old-girl networks of legacy junior colleges.
- Entry is highly exam-selective: with 2025 cut-off points of 5 (Science) and 6 (Arts), places are effectively closed to students without top-tier O-level results, narrowing accessibility for less academically strong applicants.
- As a Singapore government day school delivering the national A-Level curriculum, it offers no boarding option and no alternative curriculum (e.g. IB or British A-Levels), which limits appeal for internationally mobile families not settled into the local system.
- Admission outside the Joint Integrated Programme depends on the annual JAE posting or a competitive Direct School Admission exercise, meaning families arriving from overseas mid-course have a narrower, more procedural route in.

ADMISSIONS

Most students enter via the Ministry of Education's Joint Admissions Exercise, based on O-level L1R5 aggregate scores; the 2025 cut-off points were 5 for the Science course and 6 for the Arts course, among the more competitive nationally. A Direct School Admission (DSA-JC) exercise also runs each May to July for students with notable sporting, artistic or academic strengths. Students from the college's Joint Integrated Programme partner schools (Catholic High School, CHIJ St Nicholas Girls' School, Singapore Chinese Girls' School) transfer in directly in their fifth year without sitting O-levels. Separate published pathways exist for returning Singaporeans and international students.
