## EDITOR'S VERDICT

British International School Lagos occupies a distinctive niche in the city: an English-medium secondary school on a **30-acre** Victoria Island campus, founded in **2001**, with a British curriculum leading to Cambridge IGCSE and A Level. That combination matters. Lagos has no shortage of schools using the language of “international” education; fewer pair a sizeable urban campus with a clear academic route and a genuinely mixed student body drawn from Nigerian families and expatriates. BIS also keeps class sizes capped at **20**, a concrete operational detail that carries more weight than the usual claims about individual attention. The school’s case for a shortlist starts there: *space to breathe*, *a defined academic track*, and a setting that keeps older pupils in the centre of Lagos rather than on its outskirts.

What sets it apart is the blend of structure and range. BIS is not a nursery-to-sixth-form all-through school trying to be everything at once; it is focused on ages 11 to 18, which gives it a more secondary-school character from the outset. Cambridge exam preparation sits at the core, but the school also pushes breadth through sport, culture and creative activities. The result is *\*serious academic intent\** without the narrowness of an exam factory. Parents who value order, routine and a school day built around external examinations will find that attractive. The five-house ethos in the school's identity adds *\*a traditional boarding-school current\** even though this listing is for day pupils, and that house structure often sharpens belonging, competition and pastoral visibility in adolescent years.

There are caveats. BIS talks up “enviable” results but does not publish aggregate IGCSE or A Level outcomes in the public domain, so families must ask hard questions about grade profiles, subject take-up and university destinations. The website also contains filler text in places, which is sloppy for a school charging premium international-school fees. That does not erase the fundamentals, but it does matter: schools asking parents for trust need cleaner public communication. Even so, BIS holds three serious accreditations — BSO, COBIS and CIS — and that external scrutiny gives the school more weight than many local competitors.

The best fit is a student who wants *\*clear expectations\**, *\*a strong sense of school identity\** and a British-style academic rhythm. It suits ambitious pupils targeting IGCSEs and A Levels, children moving between Nigerian and expatriate circles, and families who want an international education without sacrificing local rootedness in Lagos. It will appeal less to students who need a progressive, highly flexible model or a broad US-style curriculum. For the right child, BIS offers *\*measured discipline\**, *\*urban convenience\** and a recognisable route to sixth-form qualifications.

#### STRENGTHS

- Follows the National Curriculum for England through to IGCSE and A-Level, giving a recognised pathway into UK and international universities.
- Located within Lagos, offering an alternative to relocating children to boarding schools abroad for a British-style education.
- As a single-campus day school, it allows for closer daily parental involvement than boarding alternatives.
- Operates within Nigeria's established international schools market, alongside other British and American curriculum providers in Lagos.
- Offers continuity of a British curriculum from Early Years through to Sixth Form under one institution.

#### TRADE-OFFS

- As a day school in Lagos, families are exposed to the city's notorious traffic congestion, which can materially affect daily school-run logistics.
- Operating in Nigeria means school life is subject to local infrastructure realities, including power supply and security considerations common to Lagos.
- Fees are not publicly itemised on the school's own site in detail, making cost comparison with peer international schools harder for prospective parents.
- Editorial ranking (1288) suggests it sits well outside the top tier of internationally benchmarked schools, reflecting a more regional than global profile.

## ADMISSIONS

Admission is typically by application through the school's registrar, with entry points at Early Years, Primary and Secondary levels, and further intake at Sixth Form for A-Level study. Prospective families should expect assessment of prior school reports and, for older entrants, some form of academic screening or interview. Places in popular year groups can be limited, particularly given demand from Lagos's established expatriate and returnee professional community, so early enquiry well ahead of the academic year is advisable.
