EDITOR'S VERDICT

What marks Lycée Français du Caire out is not glossy reinvention but institutional function. This is an AEFÉ établissement en gestion directe, accredited as Homologué, teaching in French, English and Arabic, and it sits inside the French state system overseas rather than borrowing its style. For parents who want the French Baccalaureate delivered with formal alignment to France, that matters. So does its role as the Baccalaureate exam hub for Egypt, Jordan, Djibouti, Ethiopia and Burundi: this is not a peripheral franchise but a school with regional exam weight. The average annual day fee across ages 3-18 is **€5,863**, which places it in a *strikingly accessible* bracket for a fully French international school of this type.

The school's appeal is clear and specific. It suits families who want academic continuity with France, who expect a non-religious setting, and who need a day school in Cairo rather than a boarding option. It also suits bilingual or trilingual households prepared for a French-led academic culture with English and Arabic alongside. Parents looking for an Anglo-international, broad-choice curriculum model will not find it here: the offer is the French Baccalaureate, full stop. That is a strength for the right child and a constraint for the wrong one. A student who thrives at Lycée Français du Caire will value structure, fluency across languages, and a school environment that feels **anchored**, **serious** and **unfussy** rather than tailored around individual preference.

There are limits to what the school publishes publicly. We have not seen aggregate Baccalaureate outcomes, university destinations, pupil-teacher ratios or class-size data. That leaves academic performance more opaque than it should be for an institution of this stature. Even so, the fundamentals are solid: founded in ****1994**** in its current form, serving ages ****3-18****, and operating under AEFÉ oversight, Lycée Français du Caire belongs on the shortlist of any Cairo family seeking a **clear, exam-led French education** rather than an international-school hybrid. It is **not for families shopping for flexibility**; it is for families who know exactly what the French system offers and want it delivered intact.

STRENGTHS

- Accredited by AEFÉ (Agence pour l'enseignement français à l'étranger), meaning the curriculum and exams are directly overseen by France's Ministry of Education.
- Leads to the French Baccalaureate, a qualification giving direct, recognized entry routes into French and other European university systems.
- One of the longer-established French curriculum schools in Cairo, with decades of institutional history serving expatriate and Francophone Egyptian families.
- Trilingual teaching model incorporating French, Arabic and English supports both expatriate integration and local Egyptian pupils.
- Membership of the worldwide AEFÉ network eases transfer for diplomatic or corporate families relocating to other countries with sister lycees.

TRADE-OFFS

- Instruction and assessment follow the French national system closely, which can be a poor fit for families planning onward study outside France or Francophone Europe.
- Effective participation assumes solid French language ability; families arriving with English-only backgrounds face a real adjustment period.
- Sits within central Cairo, so families should expect the traffic congestion and commute times typical of the city for a day-school model.
- Fee structure is not published transparently on the school website, meaning cost planning requires direct enrollment inquiries.

ADMISSIONS

Entry points run from early primary through terminale, with places allocated partly under AEFE conventions that give some priority to French nationals and existing AEFE-network pupils. Applicants typically submit prior school records and, for non-Francophone entrants, may be tested or required to take supplementary French-language support. Mid-cycle places, particularly in later secondary years, are limited and waiting lists are common. Direct application through the school office is standard practice rather than a centralized admissions portal.
