EDITOR'S VERDICT

Misk Schools is not a conventional single campus school. It is a Riyadh day school founded in 2016 by HRH Prince Mohammed bin Salman, covering ages 3 to 18 and teaching in both English and Arabic, with British and IB pathways under one roof. The editorial interest lies in the structure: nine single-sex academies share one campus, which gives Misk the scale and ambition of a national project rather than a standard private school. The school states its purpose with unusual clarity. This is an institution built to produce **future-facing** Saudi leadership, not to mimic an English prep school in the Gulf.

That focus gives Misk a distinct market position. In a Riyadh field crowded with schools selling either

imported British familiarity or generic internationalism, Misk offers something more specific: a Saudi school with international academic architecture and an overt leadership brief. The curriculum is delivered in English, the school holds IB accreditation, and it says it uses the High Performance Learning philosophy, with an expectation that pupils progress to top universities in Saudi Arabia and overseas. The average annual day fee is **\$24,000**, which places it in the premium bracket, though not at the extreme top end of the global international-school market. Parents paying for Misk are buying into mission as much as provision.

The school will suit children who are bright, driven and comfortable in an environment with *high institutional ambition*. It will also suit families who want serious academics without giving up a clear Saudi context. That matters: many international schools in the region talk about global citizenship in abstract terms; Misk ties its model directly to national development and Vision 2030. For the right family, that is *a sharp differentiator*. For others, it narrows the appeal. This is not the school for parents seeking a loose, bohemian, child-led culture or a low-pressure academic ride. It is for pupils who want structure, stretch and a school that treats leadership not as a poster-word but as the organising principle.

There are limits to what the school discloses publicly. It does not publish aggregate exam outcomes, university destination data, class sizes or student-teacher ratios, and that opacity matters in a school charging **\$24,000** a year on average. Still, the fundamentals are strong and unusually coherent: a **2016** foundation with royal backing, a **3–18** age range, bilingual instruction, British and IB curricula, and a campus model built around single-sex academies. Put plainly, Misk belongs on a shortlist for families who want a *purpose-built elite school* with Saudi roots, international academic credentials and an unapologetically *selective, high-pressure* sense of direction.

ADMISSIONS

Misk Schools is a day school in Riyadh for ages 3–18, so the natural entry points are likely to fall at nursery, primary, secondary and sixth-form transition stages within its bilingual British and IB structure. Beyond that, the school context provided does not publish a formal admissions calendar, so families should not assume fixed annual deadlines. For overseas or mid-year applicants in particular, availability is likely to depend on year-group capacity rather than a single entry round.

The school also does not publish, in the material provided here, the precise assessment format, interview structure or any distinctive selection mechanism. It is therefore safest to expect a standard age-appropriate admissions review rather than a highly unusual process, but the exact mix of testing, school reports and family meetings is not stated. Likewise, no bursary or financial-aid scheme is confirmed in the supplied information. Parents should ask directly whether any support exists, what documents are required, and whether admissions decisions are made before or after fee assistance is considered.
