EDITOR'S VERDICT

Stedelijk Gymnasium Utrecht trades on one fact that few schools can match: a founding date of ****1474****. That matters here because the school still does the thing that made it distinctive in the first place. This is a Dutch Gymnasium with Greek and Latin at its core, not a comprehensive school with a classical garnish. The attraction lies in that intellectual line of continuity: ancient languages, philosophy and academic discipline on one side; robotics and a modern urban setting on the other. Parents looking for **serious academic culture**, **deep-rooted tradition** and a school that treats scholarship as the main event will put it straight on the shortlist.

Its market position is clear. This is a non-religious day school in Utrecht with a **14:1** student-teacher ratio and average class size of **28**. Those numbers point to scale rather than boutique intimacy. Pupils get the energy and breadth of a larger academic institution, not the hand-held feel of a small private school. The age range of **3–18** indicates a full-through structure, which suits families who want continuity rather than repeated school transitions. The language of instruction is listed as English, which gives the school a wider international opening than the Dutch Gymnasium label alone implies. The school's edge is *intellectual seriousness* without confessional framing, and *old-school rigour* without a museum-piece atmosphere.

The right student for Stedelijk Gymnasium Utrecht is not hard to identify. This is for children who enjoy ideas for their own sake, who can cope with demanding content, and who do not need constant pastoral cushioning to stay on track. A pupil who relishes languages, argument, logic and abstraction will thrive. A child who wants a soft, heavily personalised environment or a broad-but-light curriculum will not. The strongest fit is the self-motivated student with stamina: the one who finds *scholarly intensity*, *cerebral ambition* and the disciplined study of classics energising rather than oppressive.

Why shortlist it? Because schools with real identity are rare, and this one has one. Stedelijk Gymnasium Utrecht offers a *clear intellectual proposition*: a long-established academic school where classical study still has institutional weight, and where modern subjects sit alongside it rather than replacing it. For the right family, that combination is compelling. It is not for everyone. That is part of its strength.

STRENGTHS

- The Utrechts Stedelijk Gymnasium is one of the oldest schools in the Netherlands, founded on 4 December 1474 as the Hieronymusschool by the Brethren of the Common Life.
- As a categorical gymnasium, students follow the regular VWO subjects alongside Latin and Greek, giving a broader classical academic grounding than a standard VWO school.
- The school maintains strong ties with the cities of Padua and Brno, and has for several years offered the special GLOS (formerly ELOS) track that prepares students for an international career.
- The gymnasium is one of the most popular schools in Utrecht and, like other independent gymnasia, has more applications each year than places.
- Alongside regular lessons, students choose two VVV blocks (deepen, broaden, strengthen), which can mean extra help in a difficult subject, deeper study of a topic of interest, or something entirely new, allowing the school week to be tailored to the pupil.

TRADE-OFFS

- Places are consistently oversubscribed; the school has in past years had to draw lots for places even after adding an extra intake class, and the Utrecht gymnasia have tightened entrance requirements, including a minimum Cito end-test score.
- Families cannot apply directly themselves - the child's primary school must handle the digital application, following the shared Utrecht-wide 'naar het VO' placement procedure among primary and secondary schools.
- As a 'categoraal' gymnasium, the school offers only the gymnasium/VWO-plus-classics track on site, so there is no in-house havo or vmbo route for pupils who later need a different academic level.
- Teaching is conducted entirely in Dutch within the standard Dutch Gymnasium curriculum, which assumes strong existing Dutch-language proficiency rather than offering an English-medium pathway for newly arrived expat children.

ADMISSIONS

Entry is chiefly at age 12 into the brugklas (year 7). Applications are not made directly by parents but are submitted by the pupil's primary school via Utrecht's shared 'naar het VO' digital placement procedure. Candidates need a VWO/gymnasium recommendation from their primary school plus a qualifying Cito or equivalent end-test score; Utrecht's gymnasiums have tightened this threshold in recent years. Demand consistently exceeds capacity, and in oversubscribed years places have been allocated partly by lottery, so a qualifying profile does not guarantee admission.
