EDITOR'S VERDICT

Afrikaanse Hoër Meisieskool Pretoria sits in a rare niche: an established Afrikaans girls’ day school in the capital, with a public identity forged in language, discipline and institutional memory. The appeal starts with the format. It serves girls aged 13–18, stays day-only, and teaches in Afrikaans and English. That combination matters. In Pretoria, where parents can choose between co-educational English schools, church schools and sprawling private campuses, Affies Meisies offers a more defined proposition: a girls’ school with a strong cultural centre of gravity and a narrower, more traditional brief. **Deep-rooted school spirit*, **a serious sense of belonging** and **a clear social code** are not decorative extras here; they shape the daily experience.*

What marks it out is continuity. The school context lists a founding year of **1902**, while the editorial history ties its modern identity to **1920**, when the Afrikaans-medium school took shape in open defiance of the linguistic order of the day. That heritage still gives the school its charge. Parents who want a school that treats Afrikaans not as a token language offering but as a living institutional language will put it on the shortlist quickly. The curriculum is school-declared as NSC and IEB, while the listed accreditation is NSC; that mismatch needs clarification from the school. Until that is cleaned up, the academic framework reads as less tidy than it should. Even so, the core market position is clear: this is not a cosmopolitan finishing school selling polish. It is a Pretoria stalwart selling *tradition with backbone*, *high expectations* and *collective identity*.

The right student for Afrikaanse Hoër Meisieskool Pretoria is a girl who wants structure, loyalty and visible standards rather than looseness and constant reinvention. She will do well if she likes belonging to something bigger than herself, values ritual, and is comfortable in a school where culture carries weight. A family looking for a non-religious listing should note the tension with the school-site language quoted under the Affies banner, which gives God “the place of honour”; that point also deserves a direct question. Still, for the right pupil, the attraction is obvious: **13–18** education in a focused girls’ environment, anchored in Pretoria, with *red-brick gravitas*, *old-school discipline* and an identity sturdy enough to resist fashion.

STRENGTHS

- Consistently strong matric outcomes, with the 2025 NSC cohort recording a 100% pass rate, 814 distinctions and a 98% bachelor's-level pass rate.
- A century of institutional history (founded 1920) as the sister school to Afrikaanse Hoër Seunskool, giving it an established Afrikaans-medium academic tradition in Pretoria.
- On-site boarding house accommodating around 270 girls, drawing pupils from across South Africa and as far as Namibia, which widens the intake beyond the immediate suburb.
- As a public school it operates on the low, government-regulated fee scale typical of former Model C schools, making it considerably cheaper than Pretoria's private-school alternatives.
- Offers both the National Senior Certificate (NSC) and IEB assessment routes, giving some flexibility in examination pathway.

TRADE - OFFS

- Single-sex, Afrikaans-medium instruction, which structurally excludes boys and is a poor fit for families whose daughters are not fluent or comfortable studying in Afrikaans.
- Public-school status means facilities, staffing ratios and fee-funded extras are less lavish than at fully independent private schools in the same city.
- With roughly 1,300 day pupils on one Clydesdale campus, class sizes and competition for leadership, sport and cultural placements can be intense.
- Editorial ranking (430, challenger tier) places it well behind the country's top-ranked academic schools, so families chasing the very highest national league-table position may look elsewhere.

ADMISSIONS

Grade 8 entry is processed through the Gauteng Department of Education's centralised online admissions portal, typically opening in July; other grades apply directly to the school. As an oversubscribed, well-regarded public girls' school, places are competitive, especially for boarding, and priority is generally given to those living within the feeder catchment or with sibling/family links. Proof of residence, birth certificate and prior school reports are standard requirements; Afrikaans proficiency is effectively essential given the medium of instruction.
